### **Parish ministry in a time of coronavirus**

The coronavirus pandemic has impacted every aspect of life. For parish churches such as ours, who have 'cure of souls' of all those who live within the parish boundaries (extending far beyond our regular worshipping congregation) it has posed questions over what ministry looks like in this new and strange season.

There have been some painful consequences. Not being able to visit the lonely and frail at home and in care homes can feel at times like an abandonment of those who most appreciate physical presence and contact. Pastoral conversations held across a driveway feel somewhat hopeless when a hand upon the shoulder or a hug is what you know the individual needs. Even our inability to sit down over a cup of tea comes with a pang of grief.

By the grace of God, however, there have also been wonderful moments of hope and healing. Telephone conversations and praying down the phone line have become windows of hope. Offerings left on doorsteps have been received as treasured gifts, while letters posted have been read with great delight. Worshipping together 'virtually', as our church family has been trying to do, does not come close to gathering together in person but, somehow, by

God's Spirit, it does bring us together.

None of us would have chosen this pandemic, nor the consequences it has brought to parish ministry. But we can look to see the light in the darkness, to bring hope to the hopeless, and more than anything, to remain faithful in prayer.

This too shall pass.

However, I am minded that the very word that indicates this separateness – **apart** – contains within it a deep sense of belonging, as we are 'a **part**' of the Body of Christ. As you are aware the Convent has been closed since January because of the necessary upgrading of the kitchen. In the middle of that process we heard that we also have to upgrade a lot of the fire protection throughout the house. And then Covid-19 demanded that we close the circle even more tightly so as to play our small but responsible part in not spreading the virus unnecessarily. We have been served in this by faithful friends who have shopped and delivered. Sr. Rosalind Mary is still down in Cornwall on her sabbatical. And each one of you whether at the coal face like Oblate Tony or at home living the remainder of this Holy Season alone have been playing your part. For we are one body – literally in terms of our createdness and spiritually in terms of our vocation as children of God and members of the Body of Christ.

You are all very present to us. On the occasion of Sr Janet Ann's Profession of Solemn Vows we made a tree of origami 'peace cranes' to decorate the refectory and to bring into one image the Cross and the peace and reconciliation brought to our hearts by Jesus through the gift of his life. We saved the cranes and Novice Joanna inscribed on the wings all the names of all of the members of SSC (one way of becoming familiar with all of you). They were then placed in a basket at the foot of the altar at the ceremony of my installation as Reverend Mother last May, so as to include each and every one of you. Throughout these last days, and so long as we are all separated, this

same basket sits once more at the foot of the altar. You are here, present in our hearts and prayers.
